ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Bellevue School District No. 405 from September 1, 2012 through August 31, 2013.

We evaluated internal controls and performed audit procedures on the activities of the District. We also determined whether the District complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Financial condition
- Travel
- Associated Student Body Newport High School
- Centralized Nutrition Services
- Third party cash receipting
- Infant care program
- Credit card purchases

RESULTS

In the areas we examined, the District's internal controls were adequate to safeguard public assets. The District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Bellevue School District No. 405 serves approximately 18,000 students in Bellevue as well as the communities of Clyde Hill, Medina, Hunts Points, Yarrow Point and Beaux Arts and portions of Issaquah, Kirkland, Newcastle, Redmond and unincorporated King County. The District has four high schools, five middle schools, one Mandarin dual language elementary school, one Spanish Immersion elementary school, 15 elementary schools, and two alternative middle/high schools.

An elected, five-member Board of Directors governs the District. The Board appoints a Superintendent to oversee the District's daily operations as well as its approximately 2,000 employees. For the 2012-2013 fiscal year, the District's operating budget was approximately \$191 million.

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AUDIT HISTORY

We audit the District on an annual basis. The past five audits have reported three findings. The fiscal year 2009 audit contained one finding regarding cash receipting. The fiscal year 2010 audit reported one finding regarding controls over Associated Student Body activities. The fiscal year 2011 audit reported one finding regarding the District's Alternative Learning Experience program enrollment. The District is working to resolve this finding. The other findings have been resolved.

No findings were reported in the 2008 and 2012 audits. The District management has historically been responsive to audit recommendations.
