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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In the areas we audited, Department operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The Department also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Department's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Financial condition
- Refunds payments prior audit follow-up
- Food handlers online system
- Inventory controls over immunization and drugs

On November 3, 2014, we released our Fraud Investigation report. That report disclosed the				
Department did not have adequate internal controls to monitor the check process. The refund				
checks were obtained by the budget and accounting coordinator, who had approved these				
payments, instead of being mailed. Also, The budget and accounting coordinator signed				
required approvers' names without detection.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT

The Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department was created by the city of Tacoma and Pierce County in 1971. The Department's mission is to safeguard and enhance the health of the communities of Pierce County. As part of this effort, the Department tackles known and emerging health risks through policy, programs and treatment in order to protect public health. The Department is responsible for the protection of public health in all cities and towns and unincorporated Pierce County.

An appointed, eight-member Board of Health governs the Department. The Board consists of the Pierce County Executive, three members of the Pierce County Council, the Mayor of Tacoma (or delegate), one member of the Tacoma City Council, one member at large and a member representing the Pierce County Cities and Towns Association. The Board appoints a Director of Health to oversee the Department's daily operations as well as its 249 employees. The Department is primarily funded by the city of Tacoma, Pierce County and state and federal grants. For 2014, the Department operated on an annual budget of \$31.8 million.
