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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In the areas we audited, Transportation Benefit District operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The Transportation Benefit District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Kenmore Transportation Benefit District from April 16, 2012 through December 31, 2015.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Transportation Benefit District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Open Public Meetings Act compliance
- General disbursements

- District formation
- Annual report compliance

INFORMATION ABOUT THE TRANSPORTATION BENEFIT DISTRICT

The Kenmore Transportation Benefit District (TBD) was created on April 16, 2012 by Ordinance No. 12-0339. The Transportation Benefit District has the same boundaries as the City of Kenmore.

On November 20, 2012 the governing board of the Transportation Benefit District authorized a \$20 vehicle fee via resolution No. 2012-008. The members of the Kenmore City Council constitute the governing board of the TBD.

The Transportation Benefit District began collecting the vehicle fees in June 2013. The TBD generated revenues of \$150,698 in 2013, \$322,770 in 2014 and \$334,523 in 2015. These funds are used to help pay for the City's arterial overlay program, road maintenance and preservation efforts.
