ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the City of Ocean Shores from January 1, 2013 through December 31, 2013.

We evaluated internal controls and performed audit procedures on the activities of the City. We also determined whether the City complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Open public meetings
- General revenue and expenses
- Budget compliance prior audit follow-up
- Key system controls
- Financial condition/interfund loans
- Procurement public works
- Police Department

RESULTS

In the areas we examined, the City's internal controls were adequate to safeguard public assets. The City also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

ABOUT THE CITY

The City of Ocean Shores, located in Grays Harbor County, was incorporated in 1970. The City provides its 5,815 citizens a wide range of services including public safety, fire prevention, street improvements, parks and recreation and general administration. In addition, the City operates water and sewer systems, a library and an airport.

The City formerly operated under a council-manager form of government with five elected Council Members, one of whom served as the Mayor. In 2008 the City converted to a council-mayor form of government with seven elected Council Members and an independently elected Mayor. The Mayor oversees the City's daily operations as well as its 71 employees. For 2013, the City operated on a \$25.8 million budget.
