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#### AUDIT SUMMARY

#### **Results in brief**

In the areas we audited, Town operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The Town also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

#### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Town of Twisp from January 1, 2012 through December 31, 2013.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Town's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Cash receipting
- Bid law

- Public contracting
- Grant administrative costs

#### **INFORMATION ABOUT THE TOWN**

The Town of Twisp, founded in 1909, is located at the confluence of the Twisp and Methow rivers in Okanogan County. It is the largest town in the Methow Valley, with nearly 1,000 citizens. The Town provides an array of services including water, sewer, police and fire protection. It also provides parks and recreation areas and operates a public swimming pool.

An elected, five-member Council and independently elected Mayor govern the Town. For fiscal years 2012 and 2013, the Town had nine full-time employees and operated on annual budgets of approximately \$2 million.
