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### **AUDIT SUMMARY**

### Results in brief

In the areas we audited, City operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The City also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the City of Vader from January 1, 2012 through December 31, 2013.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the City's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- General revenue and expenditures
- Key system controls
  - Cash receipting
  - General disbursements
  - Payroll

- Financial condition
- Procurement public works projects
- Utility billing
- Petty cash
- Open public meeting minutes

### STATUS OF PRIOR AUDIT FINDINGS

The status of findings contained in the prior years' audit reports of the City of Vader is provided below:

# 1. The City's declining financial condition has led to a reduction in services and puts it at risk of not being able to meet financial obligations.

### **Background**

The City operated on annual budgets of \$564,107 and \$329,355 for 2010 and 2011, respectively. During prior audits, we noted concerns regarding the City's financial condition. These concerns continue. The City's ending general fund cash balance is as follows:

At the end of 2009, the City had approximately \$120,000 in past due bills. City management has worked diligently to pay these off and is current on all payments. However, its general fund ending balance continues to be low.

#### Status

The City has taken steps to improve its financial condition. It appears the City has resolved this issue.

# 2. The City of Vader did not perform responsible bidder checks for public works contracts, allowing contracts to be awarded to an unlicensed and unregistered contractor.

### **Background**

#### **Description of Condition**

The City uses a small works roster for some public works projects. The roster lists contractors who have requested placement on it and who are licensed and registered to work

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in the state. The City may ask for price quotes for public works projects from three or more contractors on the roster, rather than going through the formal sealed bid process.

The City is required to perform responsible bidder checks prior to allowing contractors to be placed on the small works roster. These checks make sure that all contractors are properly licensed and registered with the state, have workers compensation coverage, and are not debarred from working on state or federal contracts.

The City used its small works roster for a sewer repair project that was funded by a federal grant. It also used the roster to select the same contractor for a monthly repair and maintenance contract for the system. The City obtained three quotes from the contractors on the list and selected the lowest, but did not perform the responsible bidder checks. In addition, the City did not ensure that prevailing wages were paid.

#### Status

We tested public works projects performed in the audit period and noted the City performed the responsible bidder checks and ensured prevailing wages were paid. It appears the City has resolved this issue.

### INFORMATION ABOUT THE CITY

The City of Vader serves approximately 625 citizens in Lewis County. It is administered by an elected, five-member Council and an independently elected Mayor. For fiscal year 2012 and 2013, the City's budget was approximately \$441,028 and 401,074, respectively.

The City's two employees provide services including street maintenance and sewer services.
