AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In the areas we audited, District operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Walla Walla School District No. 140 from September 1, 2013 through August 31, 2014.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Accounting/financial reporting
- Financial condition
- Cash receipting

- Teacher education and experience (staff mix) reporting
- Use of restricted funds

RELATED REPORTS

Financial

Our opinion on the District's financial statements and compliance with federal grant program requirements is provided in a separate report issued in May 2015, which includes the District's financial statements. That report is available on our website, <u>http://portal.sao.wa.gov/ReportSearch</u>.

Federal grant programs

We evaluated internal controls and tested compliance with the federal program requirements, as applicable, for the District's major federal programs, which are listed in the Federal Summary section of the financial statement and single audit report issued in May 2015. Special investigations

We noted certain matters that we communicated to District management in a letter dated May 2015, relating to loss of public funds through payroll over-reporting. We appreciate the District's commitment to resolving those matters.

Other reports

We have conducted a separate audit to examine the District's compliance with Alternative Learning Experience (ALE) requirements. A separate report will be issued and will be available on our website, <u>http://portal.sao.wa.gov/ReportSearch</u>. That separately issued report also includes the status of findings contained in the prior year audit Report No. 1008102, dated August 6, 2012, relating to the District's compliance with ALE requirements.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Walla Walla School District No. 140 provides a full range of school programs and services including elementary, middle school, high school, vocational education, bilingual education, special education, pupil transportation and food services. The District operates 10 schools and serves over 6,000 students in Walla Walla County.

An elected, five-member Board of Directors governs the District. Board Members serve staggered, four-year terms. The Board appoints a Superintendent who is responsible for day-to-day operations and oversees its staff of approximately 400 certificated and 360 classified employees. During the 2013-2014 school year, the District's operated on a budget of \$76 million.
