### **AUDIT SUMMARY**

#### Results in brief

In the areas we audited, County operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The County also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

#### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Whatcom County from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the County's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Procurement
- Payroll
- Disbursements
- Safeguarding of assets

- Self-insurance
- Court and jail receipting followup
- Restricted funds

## INFORMATION ABOUT THE COUNTY

Whatcom County serves approximately 203,500 residents under its Home Rule Charter adopted in 1978. The County has a legislative branch, composed of a seven-member County Council, and an executive branch, composed of an elected County Executive, Assessor, Auditor, Treasurer, Prosecuting Attorney and Sheriff.

The County provides an array of services including health and human services, cooperative extension, Medical Examiner, parks and recreation, planning and development services, Auditor's Office (licensing and recording), Assessor's Office, Treasurer's Office and Public Works (engineering, equipment rental, ferry and maintenance and operations). In addition, the County provides District Court, District Court probation, Superior Court, Juvenile Court (probation and detention), Law Library, Hearing Examiner's Office, jail, Sheriff (emergency management and patrol), Prosecuting Attorney's Office (criminal and civil) and Public Defender.

For fiscal year 2014, the County operated on a general fund budget of \$81.9 million and had approximately 838 employees.
