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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In the areas we audited, District operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Grays Harbor County Public Hospital District No. 1 from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Open public meetings
- General revenues and expenditures
- Financial condition
- Cash receipting/patient billings

- Compensation of public officials
- General disbursements
- Payroll
- Credit cards

We noted certain matters that we communicated to District management in a letter dated January 2015, relating to misappropriation of lab services. We appreciate the District's commitment to resolving those matters.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Grays Harbor County Public Hospital District No. 1, doing business as Summit Pacific Medical Center, owns and operates an acute care hospital licensed for 15 beds, as well as three certified rural health clinics. The District provides inpatient care, skilled nursing care, observation care, 24-hour emergency room department, lab services and diagnostic imaging services, as well as primary care services to the eastern portion of Grays Harbor County.

An elected, five-member Board of Commissioners governs the District. The Board appoints a Chief Executive Officer to oversee the District's daily operations as well as its approximate 130 full-time equivalent employees. For fiscal year 2014, the District operated on an annual net operating revenue budget of approximately \$16.6 million.
