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### **AUDIT SUMMARY**

#### Results in brief

In most areas we audited, the District's operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in most areas we examined.

However, we noted certain matters that we communicated to the District management in a letter dated May 18, 2016 related to controls over imprest fund disbursements. We appreciate the District's commitment to resolving those matters.

#### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Toledo School District No. 237 from September 1, 2013 through August 31, 2015.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Open public meetings
- General revenues and expenditures
- Significant internal controls cash receipting, payroll, and disbursements
- Self insurance

- Staff mix
- Cash receipting cafeteria/lunch
- Credit card disbursements
- Petty cash and imprest funds

### INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Toledo School District No. 237 provides public school services to approximately 720 students in kindergarten through 12th grade in Lewis County. The District has approximately 70 certificated and classified employees that provide instructional support, special education, maintenance, janitorial, transportation and office services. The district contracts for food and nursing services.

An elected, five-member Board of Directors is the primary policy-making body, exercising budgetary and financial control for the District. Board Members serve staggered, four-year terms. The Board appoints a Superintendent to oversee the District's day-to-day operations and carries out the decisions made by the Board. The District operated on budgets of about \$8 million for both the 2013-2014 and the 2014-2015 school years.
