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#### AUDIT SUMMARY

#### **Results in brief**

In the areas we audited, Transit Authority operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The Transit Authority also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

#### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Intercity Transit from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Transit Authority's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Cash receipting
- Contracts and agreements
- Financial condition
- Gas cards
- Procurement purchases
- General revenues and expenditures

- Open public meetings
- Significant accounting systems:
  - Payroll
  - Disbursements
  - Credit cards
  - Petty cash

#### **INFORMATION ABOUT THE TRANSIT AUTHORITY**

Thurston County Public Transportation Benefit Area, doing business as Intercity Transit, provides public transportation to the cities and urban areas of Olympia, Lacey, Tumwater and Yelm. The Transit Authority operates fixed-route bus and van service. Additional services include specialized transportation (Dial-a-lift) for people with disabilities, commuter services (vanpools and ride matching) and a program for people in WorkFirst.

The Transit is governed by a nine-member Board of Directors. The Board consists of one elected official from each of the following: Thurston County Board of Commissioners and the Olympia, Lacey, Tumwater and Yelm city councils. The Transit Authority appoints three citizen representatives to the Board and one non-voting member is a labor representative.

The Transit Authority has approximately 321 employees and operates on a \$40 million annual operating budget and an \$18 million annual capital budget that focuses on maintaining services to its passengers and other customers.
