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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In most areas we audited, Authority operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The Authority also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

However, we noted certain matters that we communicated to Authority management in a letter dated September 19, 2016, related to procurement. We appreciate the Authority's commitment to resolving those matters.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Three Rivers Regional Wastewater Authority from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2015.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Authority's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

• Procurement

• Payroll disbursements

• General disbursements

• New entity formation

• Petty cash fund

INFORMATION ABOUT THE AUTHORITY

Three Rivers Regional Wastewater Authority was organized in 1972 as a cooperative arrangement to maintain a regional wastewater treatment plant and provide wastewater treatment services to the City of Longview, City of Kelso, Cowlitz County and Beacon Hill Water and Sewer District. The Authority also serves some private customers for hauled waste to be treated at its facility. The Authority also accepts bio-solids from other treatment plants for treatment.

The Three Rivers Regional Wastewater Authority was re-formed as a Joint Municipal Services Agency (JMUSA) in 2016. This change included adopting the existing bylaws and elements of the intergovernmental agreement which had been in place. As part of the implementation of the JMUSA, Three Rivers Regional Wastewater Authority assumed responsibility for all accounting services and payroll as of July 1, 2016.

It is governed by a four member operating board comprised of appointed members from each of the benefitting governments. The Operating Board meets on a monthly basis. The Operating Board reports to a four member Board of Directors which is comprised of elected officials from each of the benefitting governments. The Board of Directors meets at least twice annually, with other meetings that can be set as conditions dictate. Day to day management is delegated to a superintendent who is in charge of the staff of approximately 24 employees. The Authority generated revenues of \$8.75 million and \$9.09 million in 2014 and 2015, respectively.
