AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In the areas we audited, Transit Authority operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The Transit Authority also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Grays Harbor Transit from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Transit Authority's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Open public meetings
- Cash receipting
- General disbursements

- Controls over fuel
- Procurement purchases

INFORMATION ABOUT THE TRANSIT AUTHORITY

The Grays Harbor Transportation Authority, (GHTA) doing business as Grays Harbor Transit, was incorporated in 1974 to provide transit services throughout Grays Harbor County. GHTA makes connections to Thurston and Mason County at the Intercity Transit Station; with Amtrak and Twin Transit in Lewis County; Jefferson Transit at Amanda Park and with Pacific Transit in Pacific County. The Transit Authority operates fixed route bus service, Dial-a-Ride, complimentary ADA services for people with disabilities and a Vanpool Program.

A seven-member Board of Directors governs the Transit Authority. The Board is composed of the Grays Harbor County Commissioners, three city Mayors of the areas the Transit Authority serves and one non-voting Amalgamated Transit Union representative. The Transit Authority's 77 employees operate on a \$9 million annual budget that focuses on maintaining services to customers while continuing to make improvements to the Transit Authority's internal operations.
