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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In the areas we audited, City operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The City also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the City of Milton from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2015.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the City's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Insurance/risk management
- Open public meeting minutes
- Procurement (bidding/prevailing wage)
- Accounting/financial reporting
- Billings/receivables
- Cash receipting

INFORMATION ABOUT THE CITY

The City of Milton, incorporated in 1907, serves approximately 6,575 citizens in Pierce County and portions of King County. The City provides services including police, electric, water and surface water drainage utilities. The City contracts with other local governments for jail services, with Puyallup for court services, with Pierce County for sewer services, with Pierce County Library District for library services and with East Pierce Fire and Rescue for fire protection and emergency medical services. A local vendor provides garbage collection and billing for those services.

An elected, seven-member Council and a separately elected Mayor govern the City. The Council appoints an Administrator to oversee the City's daily operations as well as its approximately 41 employees. For fiscal year 2015, the City's General Fund budget was \$3.6 million.
