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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In most areas we audited, Port operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The Port also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in most areas we examined.

However, we noted certain matters that we communicated to Port management in a letter dated June 14, 2017, related to cash receipting. We appreciate the Port's commitment to resolving those matters.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Grant County Port District No. 7 from January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2016.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Port's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

• Cash receipting

• Vendor purchases

• Debt payments

INFORMATION ABOUT THE PORT

Grant County Port District No. 7 is a special purpose district formed to help provide industrial development in Grant County. The Port serves citizens and businesses in the town of Grand Coulee and surrounding area within its boundaries.

An elected three-member Board of Commissioners governs the Port and appoints an Airport Manager to oversee the daily operations. The Port has directly operated the Banks Lake Golf Course since 2012. The Port had operating budgets of \$346,075, \$541,190 and \$239,693 for 2014, 2015 and 2016, respectively.
