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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In most areas we audited, District operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in most areas we examined.

However, we noted certain matters that we communicated to District management in a letter dated December 4, 2017, related to compliance with state bid law. We appreciate the District's commitment to resolving those matters.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Northshore Utility District from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Financial condition
- Procurement public works projects
- Procurement purchases

- Payroll disbursements
- Controls over key software applications

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

The Northshore Utility District was established in 1947 as King County Water District No. 79 to provide water distribution and wastewater collection services. In 1992, the District changed its name to Northshore Utility District. The District is located at the northeast corner of Lake Washington, and encompasses approximately 18.7 square miles to the areas of Kenmore, Lake Forest Park, West Bothell, Juanita, West Woodinville, Totem Lake, Kingsgate, Finn Hill, and North Kirkland. The District serves approximately 65,000 customers.

An elected, five-member Board of Commissioners serves as the governing body and has authority to set rates and charges for the District. Commissioners serve staggered, six-year terms. The Board appoints management to oversee the District's daily operations as well as its approximately 50 employees. For fiscal year 2016, the District had \$41.0 million in operating revenues and \$35.5 million in operating expenses.
