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## AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, District operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Central Skagit Library from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2017.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Cash counts and evaluation of controls over cash receipting and receivables at Ball Street location
- Payroll review of gross wages and leave accruals

## INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

The Central Skagit Rural Partial County Library District was created in November 2012 by voter initiative. The District operates a 2,500 square-foot facility and serves approximately 1,800 patrons and has approximately 12,000 books, periodicals, audio books and recordings, and DVDs on hand. The District also provides bookmobile services in rural areas in the Sedro-Woolley School District.

In 2013, the Skagit County Board of Commissioners appointed a five-member Board of Trustees to govern the District. Members can serve two five-year terms. The Board appoints an Executive Director to oversee the District's daily operations and 5-6 employees. The District is funded by a variety of revenue sources, including property taxes, excise taxes, and state forestry trust fees. In 2016 and 2017, the District had revenues of approximately \$ 1,118,712 and \$1,223,096, respectively.
