AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In most of the areas we examined, Town operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over safeguarding of public resources.

As referenced above, we noted certain matters that we communicated to Town management and the Mayor and Town Council in a letter dated October 23, 2018, related to cash receipting at the swimming pool. We appreciate the Town's commitment to resolving those matters.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Town of Twisp from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2017.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Town's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Payroll – gross wage recalculation and employee leave cash outs
- Cash receipting – swimming pool controls and deposits
- Self-insurance – unemployment compensation
- Compliance with conflict of interest requirements
- Procurement – public works projects
- Internal controls over purchases and vendor payments

INFORMATION ABOUT THE TOWN

The Town of Twisp, founded in 1909, is located at the confluence of the Twisp and Methow rivers in Okanogan County. It is the largest town in the Methow Valley, with nearly 1,000 citizens. The Town provides an array of services including water, sewer, police and fire protection. It also provides parks and recreation areas and operates a public swimming pool.

An elected, five-member Council and independently elected Mayor govern the Town. For fiscal years 2016 and 2017, the Town had 10 full-time employees and had approximate operating revenues of \$3.7 million and \$2.4 million, respectively.
