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AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Transportation Benefit District operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Fife Transportation Benefit District from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2017.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Transportation Benefit District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2017, 2016 and 2015, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Expenditures reviewed to ensure allowable and properly authorized and supported
- Revenues reviewed to ensure revenues received are reported accurately

INFORMATION ABOUT THE TRANSPORTATION BENEFIT DISTRICT

The Fife Transportation Benefit District was established in January 2015 by the Fife City Council. The governing board of the District is the City Council and the Mayor of Fife serves as the chairmen of the District.

The District provides funding for transportation improvements as identified in the City six-year Transportation Improvement Program, which includes improvement to roads, sidewalks and other transportation projects as fund become available.
