AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, District operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Walla Walla Watershed Management Partnership from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2017.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2017, 2016 and 2015, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Financial condition and fiscal sustainability
- Accounts payable general disbursements
- Payroll wage recalculation
- Compliance with state grant requirements

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Through cooperation and partnership among stakeholders over the past two decades, the Walla Walla Basin has demonstrated a collective commitment to enhance flows and improve water management practices for the benefit of fish, farms, and local communities. Building upon prior successes, the Walla Walla Watershed Management Partnership was legislatively authorized in 2009 as a unique, 10-year pilot local water management program for the State of Washington. The Partnership's innovative program was developed by local stakeholders in cooperation with the Washington State Department of Ecology. This effort builds on the belief that the key to augmenting stream flows for fish is for water users to employ greater local control and flexibility beyond what conventional water management options and regulation can deliver.

The Partnership took shape as a nine-member Board with two advisory committees—the Policy Advisory Group and the Water Resource Panel--and a lean professional staff. The Board and committees collectively provide a unique local governance structure including participation from diverse stakeholders: Water users, environmental interests, Tribes, citizens, governments (local, state and federal), conservation districts, bi-state (Oregon) entities, and higher education. Coordinating in shared governance of local water resources with the Department of Ecology, the Partnership works with water users to develop mutually beneficial outcomes for farms, fish, and communities in the Watershed. Walla Walla Watershed Management Partnership operated on around \$410,000 in revenues in 2015, \$540,000 in revenues in 2016, and \$530,000 in revenues in 2017.
