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AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Authority operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Pacific Hospital Preservation and Development Authority from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2017.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Authority's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Revenues generated from the parking lot
- Meal and catering expenditures
- Personnel reimbursements

INFORMATION ABOUT THE AUTHORITY

The city of Seattle chartered the Pacific Hospital Preservation & Development Authority in 1981 with the mission to support effective health care for vulnerable and disadvantaged individuals in the Puget Sound region. Its asset is the Beacon Hill property known as the Pacific Tower and its surrounding campus (known previously as the Public Health Service Hospital or Pacific Hospital).

A nine-member Council governs the Authority. Four members are appointed by the Mayor, one by the King County Executive and four by the Authority's Governing Council.

Lease payments comprise the primary revenue source for the Authority. The Authority uses lease monies from these agreements to fund health care services and programs whose goal is to decrease healthcare access and outcome disparities in King County and the Puget Sound region. The current large-scale competitive grant program was initiated in 2014. Since 2003, the Authority has provided almost \$29 million in funding for projects and programs to support health access and reduce health disparities.

An additional focus area for the Pacific Hospital PDA beginning in 2016 is property development. Work in this area includes the planned addition of affordable housing on the Pacific Tower property.
