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AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, District operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Grays Harbor County Fire Protection District No. 5 from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2017.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2017, 2016 and 2015, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Payroll – gross wage recalculation and leave balances and accruals
- Fuel card disbursements
- Open public meeting minutes
- Financial condition and fiscal sustainability

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Formed on January 11, 1955, Grays Harbor County Fire Protection District No. 5 provides fire prevention and suppression services, emergency medical aid and protection of life and property to residents living within its service boundaries. The District covers approximately 170 square-miles for fire protection and 272 square-miles for paramedic services in Grays Harbor County.

An elected, three-member Board of Commissioners governs the District. The Board appoints a Chief to oversee its daily operations. The District has one Battalion Chief/Paramedic, seven firefighters/paramedics, five part-time firefighters/EMTs, two part-time secretaries and approximately 40 volunteer firefighters. A majority of the District's revenue comes from property taxes, ambulance billings and contract for services. For 2015, 2016 and 2017, the District operated on annual budgets in the amounts of \$2,117,715.85 (2015), \$1,981,931.65 (2016) and \$1,991,040.17 (2017).
