

### **ABOUT THE AUDIT**

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the City of Blaine from January 1, 2011 through December 31, 2011.

We evaluated internal controls and performed audit procedures on the activities of the City. We also determined whether the City complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Indirect cost allocation plan
- Purchasing cards

Open Public Meetings Act

#### **RESULTS**

In the areas we examined, the City's internal controls were adequate to safeguard public assets. The City also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

#### **ABOUT THE CITY**

The City of Blaine serves approximately 4,740 citizens in northwestern Whatcom County. The City provides public safety, street improvements, planning, building and codes, parks, cemetery and general administrative services.

An elected, seven-member Council governs the City and appoints one member to serve as Mayor. The Council appoints a Manager to oversee the City's operations as well as its 58 employees. For fiscal year 2011, the City's general fund had an operating budget of approximately \$4.9 million.
