ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Mount Adams School District No. 209 from September 1, 2011 through August 31, 2013.

We evaluated internal controls and performed audit procedures on the activities of the District. We also determined whether the District complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Open Public Meetings Act
- Payroll
- Teacher education and experience (staff mix) reporting
- Cash receipting
- Student transportation reporting
- Associated Student Body cash receipting

RESULTS

In the areas we examined, the District's internal controls were adequate to safeguard public assets. The District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Mount Adams School District No. 209 serves approximately 990 students in Yakima County. It provides a full-range of school programs and services including basic elementary, middle school, high school, vocational education, bilingual education, pupil transportation, food services, special education and numerous special programs for remedial and enriched education. The District operates three school campuses.

An elected, five-member Board of Directors governs the District. The Board appoints management to oversee the District's daily operations as well as its 69 certified and 64 classified employees. In 2012 and 2013, the District operated on a budget of approximately \$12 million for each of the two years under audit.

We typically audit the District every two years. The past five audits reported two findings. We issued findings in in 2009 and 2007, both regarding internal controls over Associated Student Body cash receipting. These issues have been resolved.
