ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Bellingham Transportation Benefit District No. 1 from January 1, 2011 through December 31, 2013.

We evaluated internal controls and performed audit procedures on the activities of the Transportation Benefit District. We also determined whether the Transportation Benefit District complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of noncompliance, misappropriation or misuse. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

• Formation

• Submission of annual report

• Open Public Meetings Act

RESULTS

In the areas we examined, the Transportation Benefit District's internal controls were adequate to safeguard public assets. The Transportation Benefit District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined.

ABOUT THE TRANSPORTATION BENEFIT DISTRICT

Bellingham Transportation Benefit District No. 1 was established by the city of Bellingham in July 2010. The city created this separate legal entity under RCW 36.73 to provide additional financing for the city's transportation related activities. The city collects 0.2 percent of sales and use tax on the Transportation Benefit District's behalf and funds the annual arterial pavement resurfacing program, transit enhancement options, and nonmotorized transportation options.

The Bellingham City Council serves as the Board of Directors, with the city Finance Director acting as the Transportation Benefit District Treasurer. City employees perform all operations and administrative functions of the Transportation Benefit District. The Transportation Benefit District covers the same area as the city and had operating expenditures of \$1.2 million in 2011, \$3.2 million in 2012, and \$4.5 million in 2013.
