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AUDIT SUMMARY

Results in brief

In most areas we audited, District operations complied with applicable requirements and provided adequate safeguarding of public resources. The District also complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in most areas we examined.

However, we noted certain matters that we communicated to District management in a letter dated December 11, 2017, related to the reimbursement of foundation expenses. We appreciate the District's commitment to resolving those matters.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the King County Rural Library District from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2016.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Payroll system review
- Small and attractive asset review
- General disbursements

- Self-insurance unemployeement compensation
- Foundation contract review

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

The King County Rural Library District, doing business as the King County Library System, is one of the largest circulating libraries in the United States with 49 community libraries and 17 outreach vehicles. The District circulated over 20.8 million items in 2016, plus an additional 3.5 million item downloads, and serves more than 1.4 million residents. The District offers a collection of more than 4.3 million items including books, ebooks, periodicals, newspapers, CDs, DVDs, films, and extensive online resources.

A five-member Board of Trustees, appointed by the King County Council, governs the District. The District has more than 1,200 employees. The general fund budget for library operations in 2016 was \$125 million, which includes \$12.2 million for capital outlay.
