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AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Center operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of WHITCOM from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2016.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Center's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2016 and 2015, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Financial condition and fiscal sustainability
- Compliance with state grant requirements

- Procurement for purchases
- Contracts/agreements interlocal agreements

Financial

Our opinion on the Center's financial statements is provided in a separate report, which includes the Center's financial statements. That report is available on our website, http://portal.sao.wa.gov/ReportSearch.

That report includes a finding for a material weakness in internal controls over financial reporting regarding the omission of the Center's net pension liability in the Schedule of Liabilities and other errors in the financial statements and notes to the financial statements.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE CENTER

The Whitman County Regional Communication Center, doing business as WHITCOM, provides Emergency 9-1-1 communication services to citizens in Whitman County, Asotin County and the city of Moscow, Idaho.

The Center is governed by an eight-member Executive Board composed of two voting members from each governing agency: Whitman County, Washington State University and the city of Pullman. Asotin County and the city of Moscow have nonvoting ex-officio members. The Board appoints a Director to oversee the Center's day-to-day operations as well as its 22 employees. The Center oversees fiscal activities of approximately \$3 million, annually.
