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AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Agency operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Aging and Long Term Care of Eastern Washington from January 1, 2016 through December 31, 2017.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Agency's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Payroll bonus and incentive payments, and wages
- General disbursements travel expenditures and reimbursements

INFORMATION ABOUT THE AGENCY

Aging and Long Term Care of Eastern Washington is located in Spokane County and was formed in January 1978 to serve the citizens in Pend Oreille, Spokane, Stevens, Whitman and northern Ferry counties. The mission of the Agency is to promote well-being, independence, dignity and choice for all older persons and for individuals needing long term care in Ferry, Stevens, Pend Oreille, Spokane and Whitman counties. The Agency accomplishes this through analysis of long-term care needs in nutrition, transportation, housing, medical care and other services.

The Agency is administered by a Governing Board composed of one commissioner from each of the five counties in the service area, three representatives of the City of Spokane and the Chairperson of the Planning and Management Council. The Board appoints management to oversee the Agency's daily operations as well as its 80 employees. For 2016, the Agency operated on a budget of \$13.2 million. For 2017, the Agency operated on a budget of \$13.6 million.
