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AUDIT RESULTS

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Port operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Port of Kennewick from January 1, 2017 through December 31, 2018.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the Port's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Accounts payable general disbursements
- Payroll gross wage calculation, leave cash outs, bonus and incentive payments
- Procurement public works and professional services
- Surplus land disposition and receipt of sales proceeds
- Self-insurance unemployment compensation

INFORMATION ABOUT THE PORT

The Port of Kennewick was formed in 1915 with the primary mission being to foster economic development. The Port boundaries encompass the cities of Kennewick and West Richland, the portion of Richland located south of the Yakima River and the surrounding areas of Benton County.

The Port is governed by an elected, three-member Board of Commissioners. Commissioners serve staggered, six-year terms. The Board appoints an executive director to oversee the Port's daily operations and 14 full-time employees. The Port's assets include marina facilities, an airport and multiple industrial parks. The Port had about \$1.2 million and \$1.3 million in operating revenues for 2017 and 2018, respectively. Additionally, the Port collected tax revenues of \$3.9 million in 2017 and \$4.1 million in 2018.
