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#### **AUDIT RESULTS**

#### Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, District operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

#### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Cross Valley Water District from January 1, 2017 through December 31, 2018.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Accounts receivable and cash receipting customer utility payments
- Accounts payable electronic funds transfers and procurement cards
- Tracking and monitoring theft sensitive assets, such as computers, tools, and equipment
- Self-insurance for unemployment compensation
- Financial condition and fiscal sustainability
- IT systems and data data conversion and user access

### INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

The Cross Valley Water District, located in Snohomish County, was incorporated in 1990 and previously operated as a private water association. The District serves approximately 6,763 water customers and 108 sewer customers. In 2017 and 2018, the District spent \$5,478,986 and \$5,556,613, respectively, to operate its water and sewer system. The District uses wells that are fed by groundwater aquifers to provide water to the majority of its customers. To supplement its own water supply, the District purchases water from the City of Everett, the Silver Lake Water District and the Clearview Water Supply Agency, of which it is part-owner. In order to provide sewer services, the District sends its sewage to the Silver Lake Water District and the King County Wastewater Treatment division for processing.

An elected, three-member Board of Commissioners governs the District. Commissioners serve staggered, six-year terms. The Board appoints management to oversee the District's daily operations and its 13 employees.
