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AUDIT RESULTS

Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, District operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Battle Ground School District No. 119 from September 1, 2018 through August 31, 2019.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the year ended August 31, 2019, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Payroll – gross pay and leave cash outs
- Student enrollment reporting
- Accounts payable – general disbursements, credit cards and electronic funds transfers
- Tracking and monitoring of theft sensitive assets, such as computers, tablets and equipment
- Establishment of local revenue and expenditure accounts
- Use of restricted funds – professional learning
- Procurement – purchases and public works

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Battle Ground School District No. 119 serves more than 13,000 students in Clark County. The District has six primary schools, seven middle schools, one Grade K-8 school, two high schools, three alternative schools, an Open Doors Program and the Center for Agriculture, Science and Environmental Education.

The District is governed by an elected, five-member Board of Directors. The Board establishes policies for the District and appoints the Superintendent, who is the chief administrative officer. The District employs approximately 1,650 employees. The District is supported primarily by state funds, property taxes and federal grants. During the 2018-2019 fiscal year, the District operated on an annual budget of approximately \$187.8 million.
