AUDIT RESULTS

Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Public Charter School operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Innovation-Willow Public Charter School from September 1, 2018 through August 31, 2019.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the Public Charter School's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the year ended August 31, 2019, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Banking Debit Card Transactions
- Travel reimbursements to contracted consultants Support for payments
- Vendor contracts Support for payments
- Use of restricted funds Professional Learning Allocation expenditures
- Student enrollment reporting review for student eligibility in basic education
- Student transportation reporting review for student ridership counts that drive funding
- Open public meetings documentation of minutes, executive sessions, and expenditure approvals
- Electronic Funds Transfers (EFT) controls over disbursements
- Subfunds establishment of revenue and expenditure accounts

INFORMATION ABOUT THE PUBLIC CHARTER SCHOOL

Innovation Schools, doing business as Willow Public Charter School (Innovation-Willow Public Charter School), located in Walla Walla County, provided educational services to approximately 94 students in grades 6-8 during the 2018-2019 school year.

The Public Charter School is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation established under RCW 28A.710.020 and governed by a maximum eleven member appointed Board of Directors that establishes policies for the Public Charter School according to the terms of a renewable, five year charter contract executed under RCW 28A.710.160. Innovation Schools is authorized by Washington State Charter School Commission to operate Willow Public Charter School by a five-year contract effective August 22, 2017 and terminating August 22, 2022.

The Public Charter School received approximately \$1 million in direct state and federal funding for fiscal year 2018-2019. The Public Charter School operated in one building and employed approximately 25 employees.
