AUDIT RESULTS

Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Department operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

However, we noted certain matters related to Cost Allocation, Small and Attractive Assets, and Monitoring of Agents and Subagents that we communicated to Department management and the Executive Director in a letter dated July 19, 2022. We appreciate the Department's commitment to resolving those matters.

Additionally, as noted under the Related Reports – Special Investigations section of this report, certain matters were examined and reported as part of a separate engagement.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Department of Licensing from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2021.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.310, which requires the Office of the Washington State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all state agencies. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the Department's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

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Based on our risk assessment for the years ended June 30, 2021 and 2020, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Cash receipting timeliness and completeness of deposits, voids and adjustments at license service offices
- Compliance with service contracts agents and subagents
- Payroll gross wages and overtime
- Accounts payable purchase cards
- Revenue posting professional license, motor vehicle license and Parks Discover Pass sales
- Firearms license fees and permits compliance with the application of fees
- Revenue refunds
- Small and attractive assets

RELATED REPORTS

Financial

We perform an annual audit of the statewide basic financial statements, as required by state law (RCW 43.09.310). Our opinion on these financial statements is included in the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR). The ACFR reflects the financial activities of all funds, organizations, institutions, agencies, departments and offices that are part of the state's reporting entity. That report is issued by the Office of Financial Management in December of each year and can be found at www.ofm.wa.gov.

Federal programs

In accordance with the Single Audit Act, we annually audit major federal programs administered by the state of Washington. Rather than perform a single audit of each agency, we audit the state as a whole. The results of that audit are published in a report issued by the Office of Financial Management in March of each year.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT

The Department touches the lives of nearly every Washington resident. The Department issues more than six million driver licenses and identification cards and licenses more than eight million vehicles and vessels. The Department is not your typical "DMV" in that it also licenses and regulates more than 300,000 businesses and individuals across 36 professions and collects more than \$3.1 billion per fiscal year in fees and fuel tax that funds the state's transportation network.

The Department operates with 1,450 employees that work in five buildings in Olympia and Tumwater and 55 Licensing Services Offices throughout the state. In addition, the Department oversees 180 county auditor offices and sub-agents. The DOL has a 2019-21 biennial budget of \$425.4 million.

The Department is 85% funded by the Transportation budget and 15% by Omnibus funds that mostly come from dedicated professional licensing accounts. The Department's Purpose Statement is to "Help every Washington resident live, work, drive, and thrive."
