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## **AUDIT RESULTS**

#### Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, District operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

#### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Seattle Convention Center from January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the Washington State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the District's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the year ended December 31, 2021, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Accounts payable general disbursements
- Payroll overtime
- Open public meetings compliance with minutes, meetings and executive session requirements
- Financial condition reviewing for indications of financial distress

## INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

The Washington State Convention Center Public Facilities District (Seattle Convention Center) was created on July 19, 2010, by King County (Ordinance 16883), pursuant to Substitute Senate Bill 6889, which authorized the creation of the public facilities district by King County and the transfer of assets and liabilities from the nonprofit corporation, established by the Washington State Legislature in 1982, to design, construct, promote and operate the Washington State Convention Center.

The District is a municipal corporation governed by a nine-member Board of Directors which establishes and approves policy and budgets. Three members of the Board are appointed by the Governor of the state, three members of the Board are nominated by the County Executive subject to confirmation by the County Council, and three members of the Board are nominated by the Mayor of the City of Seattle subject to confirmation by the City Council.

The District operates a convention center that generates significant regional economic activity by attracting conventions, tradeshows, and other events to the State of Washington. The District generates event-related revenue primarily from the sale and use of meeting and exhibition space, the sales of services that support the use of that space, such as electricity, water/drain, audio/video and telecommunications, and sale on food and beverage at the facility. The District also operates three separate public parking garages in downtown Seattle. In addition, the District administers a \$2 billion debt portfolio, receives approximately \$40 million to \$95 million annually in lodging tax, and runs a treasury operation that supports the City of Seattle, King County, and the State of Washington.

The District's business was materially affected by COVID-19. COVID-19 is a global pandemic that has been declared a national and public health emergency for the United States and a state of emergency for Washington State. The District's operating revenue for fiscal year 2021 exceeded \$7.4 million. There was a total of 28 events in 2021 with 65,166 attendees. Events and attendees were down from 2020 numbers which were 30 and 94,885 respectively. Non-operating lodging tax revenues were \$42.3 million for fiscal year 2021 and in 2019 (before COVID) were \$94.3 million.
