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AUDIT RESULTS

Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Trust operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Association of Washington Cities Employee Benefit Trust Health Care Program from January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2021.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the Washington State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the Trust's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2021, 2020 and 2019, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Compliance with solvency requirements
- Claims payments – eligibility of claims, accuracy of payments, and compliance with policies
- Procurement – professional services
- Risk pool membership – eligibility of non-city members
- Open public meetings – compliance with minutes, meetings and executive session requirements

INFORMATION ABOUT THE TRUST

The Association of Washington Cities (AWC) Employee Benefit Trust Health Care Program (HCP) is a local government risk sharing pool, formed to provide health insurance coverage to participating members of the HCP. The members are made up of cities, towns and other local governmental entities throughout the State of Washington. The self-insured pool was formed January 1, 2014, and is located in Thurston County. The HCP provides medical, dental and vision coverage to 257 participating members. In lieu of having employees, the administrative functions of the HCP are performed under contract with the AWC, and the individuals who perform services for the HCP are all employees of AWC.

The HCP is governed by an eight-member Board of Trustees, comprised of elected city officials and city staff within the state who are members of the Employee Benefit Trust. The primary source of revenue for the HCP comes from member contributions and its major expenses are payments of claims and claims-related expenses. For fiscal years 2021, 2020 and 2019, the HCP had operating revenues of \$224,320,727, \$216,092,058 and \$221,500,554, respectively.
