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AUDIT RESULTS

Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, District operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Public Utility District No. 1 of Benton County from January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the Washington State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the District's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the year ended December 31, 2022, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Procurement public works, purchases, and professional services
- Accounts receivable adjustments
- Accounts payable credit cards
- Payroll bonus and incentive payments
- Surplus equipment disposition and receipt of sales proceeds
- Self-insurance for unemployment and paid family and medical leave
- Open public meetings compliance with minutes, meetings, and executive session requirements
- Financial condition reviewing for indications of financial distress

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Public Utility District No. 1 of Benton County was established in 1934 to engage in the purchase, generation, transmission, distribution and sale of electric energy. The District also provides wholesale telecommunication services. Covering about 939 square miles of Benton County, the District's service area provides services to about 56,900 customers. The District's properties include 39 substations, about 105 miles of 115kV transmission line, 1,740 miles of distribution lines, and other buildings, equipment, stores and related facilities. The main administrative offices are located in Kennewick with a branch office in Prosser.

An elected, three-member Board of Commissioners governs the District. The Board appoints management to oversee the District's operations and about 150 employees. In fiscal year 2022, the District's operating revenue was \$180 million and operating expenditures were \$173 million.
