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AUDIT RESULTS

Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Housing Authority operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Housing Authority of the City of Seattle from January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the Washington State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the Housing Authority's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the year ended December 31, 2022, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Cash receipting - timeliness and completeness of deposits at the Central Office
- Procurement - public works, architectural, and engineering contracts
- Payroll – overtime, retroactive pay
- Open public meetings – compliance with minutes, meetings and executive session requirements
- Financial condition – reviewing for indications of financial distress

INFORMATION ABOUT THE HOUSING AUTHORITY

The City of Seattle created the Seattle Housing Authority in 1939. The Housing Authority owns and operates about 4,300 public housing units subsidized by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and manages approximately 3,100 units in other housing programs. The Housing Authority administers a federal grant program providing rental vouchers for over 18,000 households. This provides safe and affordable living environments to over 38,000 low-income residents.

The Mayor of Seattle appoints the seven-member Board of Commissioners to staggered, four-year terms. The Board appoints an Executive Director to administer daily operations. The Housing Authority has approximately 734 employees. Funding to cover housing costs and operations consists of federal operating subsidies, grants, rent, miscellaneous fees and investment income. The Authority is redeveloping existing projects. This redevelopment is largely funded by federal grants, state and city funds, and tax credit investments through limited partnerships and bonds. For 2022, the Housing Authority had operating revenues and expenditures of \$345.9 million and \$280 million, respectively.
