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#### **AUDIT RESULTS**

#### **Results in brief**

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Authority operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

#### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Pike Place Market Preservation and Development Authority from January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the Washington State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the Authority's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the year ended December 31, 2022, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Accounts payable electronic funds transfers
- Compliance with travel and training policies
- Accounts receivable tenant rent credits
- Open public meetings Compliance with minutes, meetings and executive session requirements
- Financial condition Reviewing for indications of financial distress

#### **INFORMATION ABOUT THE AUTHORITY**

The Pike Place Market Preservation and Development Authority is a public corporation chartered by the City of Seattle in 1973 to own and administer the City's Pike Place Market Historic District.

A 12-member volunteer Council governs the Authority. The Council consists of four mayoral appointees, four members elected by the Market Constituency and four members appointed by the Authority's Council.

The Authority, along with its component units, have annual operating expenses of approximately \$25.9 million and approximately 106 full-time and four part-time employees. The Authority is the landlord for approximately 220 commercial tenants and over 265 day-stall vendors at Pike Place Market. It offers space to four social service agencies and provides over 400 residential units to the low and moderate income population. The Authority also operates an 800 parking-stalls garage with an average of 1,200 cars per day.
