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AUDIT RESULTS

Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, Department operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

However, as noted under the Related Reports – Special Investigations section of this report, certain matters were examined and reported as part of a separate engagement.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Department of Revenue from July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2023.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.310, which requires the Office of the Washington State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all state agencies. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the Department's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Working Families Tax Credit eligibility and payment calculations
- Capital Gains Tax calculations and collections
- Cash receipting timeliness and completeness of deposits
- Payroll gross wages
- Property taxes exemptions and deferrals
- Accounts payable travel expenditures, reimbursements and stipends, and purchase cards

RELATED REPORTS

Financial

We also perform an annual audit of the statewide basic financial statements, as required by state law (RCW 43.09.310). Our opinion on these financial statements is included in the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR). The ACFR reflects the financial activities of all funds, organizations, agencies, departments and offices that are part of the state's reporting entity. The results of that audit are published in a report issued by the Office of Financial Management in December of each year and can be found at <u>www.ofm.wa.gov</u>.

Our opinion on the Department of Revenue's basic financial statements is included in the Department's separate Annual Comprehensive Financial Report.

Federal programs

In accordance with the Single Audit Act, we annually audit major federal programs administered by the state of Washington. Rather than perform a single audit of each agency, we audit the state as a whole. The results of that audit are published in a report issued by the Office of Financial Management in March of each year.

Special investigations

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DEPARTMENT

The Department's mission is to fairly and efficiently collect revenues to fund public services and it is responsible to fairly, efficiently, and uniformly administer state tax laws. As Washington state's primary tax collection agency, the Department oversees more than 60 different taxes while collecting more than 93% of the state General Fund tax revenues.

Its primary activities include state and local tax revenue collection and distribution and property tax administration. Other key responsibilities include licensing businesses and managing the state's Unclaimed Property program, Working Families Tax Credit Program, and the Capital Gains Tax Program.

In state fiscal year 2023, the Department collected \$33.2 billion in revenue from more than 606,000 registered businesses. In addition, the Department collected approximately \$7.7 billion in local revenue.

The Department's 2021-2023 biennial budget totaled \$640.3 million and employed approximately 1,500 staff. Headquartered in Tumwater, the Department has 11 field offices located throughout the state. The Department also employs approximately 55 auditors in out-of-state locations.

We take our role as partners in accountability seriously. The Office provides training and technical assistance to governments both directly and through partnerships with other governmental support organizations.

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
