AUDIT RESULTS

Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In those selected areas, District operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over the safeguarding of public resources.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Marysville School District No. 25 from September 1, 2022 through August 31, 2023.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the Washington State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the District's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the year ended August 31, 2023, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We assessed the District's financial condition during our audit of the District's financial statements. See the related reports section of this report to access these results. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Payroll leave balances and accruals, pay adjustment approvals, and review of employee certifications
- Accounts payable credit cards
- Use of restricted funds professional learning and local revenue for enrichment activities
- Compliance with supplemental contracts for enrichment activities
- Open public meetings compliance with minutes, meetings and executive session requirements

Our opinion on the District's financial statements and compliance with federal grant program requirements is provided in a separate report, which includes the District's financial statements. Federal grant programs

We evaluated internal controls and tested compliance with the federal program requirements, as applicable, for the District's major federal programs, which are listed in the Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs section of the separate financial statement and single audit report. INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

Marysville School District No. 25 provides public school services to approximately 9,693 students in kindergarten through 12th grade. The District's service area covers approximately 70 square miles and includes the City of Marysville and neighboring portions of Snohomish County and the Tulalip Tribes. The District has four high schools, three middle schools, one middle option school, one K-8 School-Home Partnership Program, ten elementary schools, one K-5 parent cooperative school, an early learning center that includes early childhood program, and a developmental preschool.

An elected, five-member Board of Directors governs the District. The Board appoints a Superintendent to oversee the District's daily operations as well as its staff of approximately 718 certificated and 440 classified employees. For fiscal year 2023, the District's general fund expenditures totaled approximately \$192.8 million.
