Report on Accountability

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AUDIT RESULTS

Results in brief

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In most of the areas we examined, District operations complied, in all material respects, with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over safeguarding of public resources.

As referenced above, we identified areas where the District could make improvements. These recommendations are included with our report as a finding.

We also noted certain matters related to supplemental contracts, employee contracts and additional pay that we communicated to District management and the Board of Directors in a letter dated September 3, 2024. We appreciate the District's commitment to resolving those matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. As a result, no information is provided on the areas that were not examined.

About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of Taholah School District No. 77 from September 1, 2022 through August 31, 2023.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the Washington State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved obtaining evidence about the District's use of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters. The procedures performed were based on our assessment of risks in the areas we examined.

Based on our risk assessment for the year ended August 31, 2023, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. We examined the following areas during this audit period:

- Open public meetings compliance with minutes, meetings and executive session requirements
- Compliance with supplemental contracts for enrichment activities
- Payroll gross wages, overtime, and electronic funds transfers

- Use of restricted funds professional learning and local revenue for enrichment activities
- Accounts payable general disbursements and credit cards
- Financial condition reviewing for indications of financial distress

SCHEDULE OF AUDIT FINDINGS AND RESPONSES

Taholah School District No. 77 September 1, 2022 through August 31, 2023

2023-001 The District lacked adequate internal controls for ensuring compliance with the Open Public Meeting Act.

Background

Taholah School District No. 77 provides public school services to about 166 students in kindergarten through 12th grade in Grays Harbor County. The District's five-member Board of Directors is the primary policy-making body exercising budgetary and financial control for the District. The District operates on a \$5.8 million annual general fund budget.

The District is responsible for designing, implementing and maintaining internal controls that ensure compliance with state law as well as provide reasonable assurance that it is safeguarding public resources.

The Washington Open Public Meetings Act (OPMA) requires public agency governing bodies to hold discussions and make business decisions in an open public forum, and formally establish a set schedule for regular meetings. State law (RCW 42.30) requires the District school board to promptly record minutes of regular and special meetings and make them available for public inspection.

Description of Condition

The District lacked effective internal controls for ensuring it complied with OPMA requirements for meeting minutes. The District held 41 meetings from September 1, 2022, through August 31, 2023. Of these meetings and the minutes available for audit, we found the District:

- Did not have minutes for 31 meetings
- Did not promptly record meeting minutes
- Did not document the time it would resume open public meetings after executive sessions

Cause of Condition

The District experienced high turnover in key positions as well as extended staff absences and did not provide the necessary resources to ensure compliance with the OPMA.

Effect of Condition

The District does not have an official record of business the Board conducted at its meetings, therefore depriving the public of this information. Additionally, when the District does not announce the time it will return from executive session, the public is unaware of the time to return for the open public meeting.

Recommendation

We recommend the District retain documentation of all meeting minutes and promptly make them available for public inspection.

District's Response

In response to this finding the district recognizes several deviancies in district personal performance. Under the guidance of new Superintendent Dr. Herman Lartigue, the district has replaced the previous HR Director, who is responsible to record and maintain official school board minutes. In the future the Superintendent will ensure that previous board meeting minutes are presented to the school board for review and approval at each new regularly scheduled board meeting.

Auditor's Remarks

We thank the District for its cooperation throughout the audit and the steps it is taking to address these concerns. We will review the status of the District's corrective action during our next audit.

The Superintendent and staff administer day-to-day operations of the District and carry out decisions made by the Board. The District operates on a \$5.8 million annual general fund budget and its approximately 52 employees provide basic education and support services.
