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#### **AUDIT RESULTS**

This report describes the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined. In most of the areas we examined, District operations complied with applicable state laws, regulations, and its own policies, and provided adequate controls over safeguarding of public resources.

As referenced above, we noted certain matters that we communicated to District management and Board of Supervisors in a letter dated July 25, 2019, related to District operations, financial condition and compliance with open public meetings. We appreciate the District's commitment to resolving those matters.

#### About the audit

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Thurston Conservation District from January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2018.

Management is responsible for ensuring compliance and adequate safeguarding of public resources from fraud, loss or abuse. This includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls relevant to these objectives.

This audit was conducted under the authority of RCW 43.09.260, which requires the Office of the State Auditor to examine the financial affairs of all local governments. Our audit involved performing procedures to obtain evidence about the District's uses of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures, and internal controls over such matters.

In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity or area. Instead, based on our risk assessment for the years ended December 31, 2018, 2017, 2016 and 2015, the areas examined were those representing the highest risk of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance. The following areas were examined during this audit period:

- Financial condition and fiscal sustainability
- Open public meetings documentation of minutes and executive sessions
- Bank statement reconciliations
- Compliance with state grants
- Accounts payable credit card and travel expenditures
- Cash receipting including petty cash
- Payroll review of retroactive adjustments

#### INFORMATION ABOUT THE DISTRICT

The Thurston Conservation District was established in 1947 to educate and assist the residents of the Thurston County community with conservation programs, services and project funding. The District is governed by a five-member Board of Supervisors consisting of three elected Supervisors and two Supervisors appointed by the Conservation Commission. The Board appoints management to oversee the District's daily operations.

The District operates with approximately 10 employees. The District typically receives approximately one-third of its funding annually from a local assessment fee (Rates and Charges beginning in 2019) of \$5.00 per parcel and \$0.10 per acre, that is levied on most properties in the Thurston County boundaries (excluding the 1947 boundaries of Rainier, Tenino and Yelm). The remainder of the funding comes from competitive grants (primarily state funding sources) for conservation projects, technical assistance and education. For the years 2015 through 2018, the District operated on an average budget of \$1.3 million.
